

## Why is God Hanging Out with *Them?*

Everyday on the job as the Public Relations manager for Jesus would have been part comedy, part nightmare.

For starters, he had poor taste in friends. Case in point: the common people of Jesus's day detested the money-hungry, backstabbing tax gougers; but Jesus marches right up to one of those traitors and says, "Follow me."

Jesus ruined his reputation by not only welcoming, but actively seeking out the wrong people. From the perspective of respectable society: Jesus was a controversial disaster.

From a career perspective he was a failure.

From a religious perspective he was a troublemaker.

### But from God's perspective, Jesus could do no wrong.

To ask the question: "What would Jesus do?" Is to be set up for failure, because the Jesus we encounter is so *unpredictable*.

If you ask me, "What would Jesus do?" I'd say, "Probably what you would least expect." He would ruin his reputation among the religious by hanging out with those with poor reputations. He would speak hard truth when soft white lies would make life easier. He would touch lepers; compliment prostitutes and insult priests. He would flaunt his freedom in the face of legalists and eventually get himself so deep in trouble that he ends up on trial and condemned to a cross.

The wisdom of God will always look like foolishness to us. God chooses ungodlike ways to bring ungodly sinners into his kingdom of outcasts who get everything by grace.

Jesus just doesn't match any of our expectations. Thank God he doesn't.

He befriends all of us, no matter who we are, no matter how ruined we are, no matter how good or bad we think we are.

He calls us, one and all, to himself. And in him we become part of that motley crew of redeemed fools whom Jesus calls friends.

As you read and listen to these stories of Jesus walking, talking, dining and touching the varied people of his time, may you too meet Jesus again and be grasped by his love and changed once more.
