The Time of the Prophets

Our tour of the Old Testament this Spring leads us into the time of the Old Testament Prophets.

The prophets dared, even in their full, flawed humanity to unabashedly preach "Thus says the Lord..." God's word coming to them rather than from them.

The purpose of the prophets was to present the reality of God to the lives of the people;

reminding them of God's commands, promises, and presence in their lives and communities, as well as their vocation to the nations of the world.

Humans like to keep God at the margins of our lives, or we make God into something that suits us a mere reflection of ourselves.

The prophets insist that we deal with God as God has been revealed, not as we imagine.

These Prophets hep us to pay attention to the conditions needed to live a faithful life in relationship with God; purging our hearts and imaginations of this world's views of life, reminding us of what really matters.

In the face of injustice, oppression, falsehood, death and sin, the prophets ignite hope, speaking truth, and opening life to the new work of salvation that God is bringing at all times everywhere.

Their words tell us that divisions we live by in life: sacred and secular, private and public, practical and spiritual, are false ones. God has something to say about every aspect of our lives: our use of money, the politics we embrace our work, our spare time, our homes, our families, our neighbours.

Nothing is hidden from God, nothing escapes his rule or purpose. The writings of the prophets remind us that nothing is more real than God, his presence is in every part of life and in every face we meet.

Reflecting on Scripture

- 1. Where is God in the story? How is God at work? What does this passage teach you about God?
- 2. Who are the people in the story? Who would you be in the story? What does this passage teach about being human? About yourself?
- 3. What stood out about this story? What verse or word? What do you see or picture? What is strange, difficult or uncomfortable about this reading?
- 4. What do you think this story meant to the people who first heard it? What do you think it means today?
- 5. How does this story move you toward Jesus? How does this story fit into the bigger story of God's salvation through Jesus?
- 6. After reading this scripture, what questions do you have? What parts don't you understand? What questions would you ask God? The People?
- 7. In reading this passage how might it shape your prayers? How might it shape your actions? What does it ask you to do or not to do?
- 8. What does this scripture teach you about loving God and loving your neighbours?
